## Benedict Awards

Michigan can be proud that two of our hosta hybridizers have cultivars that are in the running for the American Hosta Society's Benedict Medal, the highest award given in recognition of hosta that demonstrates superior performance in the garden. Winners of this award must have a hosta that is so spectacular, that it can be recognized from a distance and is appreciated in the landscape. It is not easy to win the Benedict Medal. A nominated cultivar must undergo rigorous competition and it must advance through a series of votes and receive enough votes each time that it finally can be considered for the Medal. If the hosta fails to receive enough votes in each tier of judging within 5 years, it will not advance and is dropped from the awards. Only one cultivar will receive the award annually.

Given the steps necessary to even be considered for the Benedict Medal, it is quite an accomplishment when a person's hosta that they have hybridized reaches the point where their cultivar can be considered in

the final round of voting for this coveted award. And so, congratulations are in order for 2 of our very own hybridizers, Clarence Owens of Jackson and Hans Hansen of Zeeland, for reaching the final level of voting! Their hostas will now compete for a chance to win the Benedict Medal. Voting will conclude in November and the winner will be announced at the AHS convention in Green Bay, Wisconsin in June.



Hans is not a new-comer to the awards. He usually has several of his hybrids competing in the Benedict Awards. Right now, he has four of his hosta in the final round of voting and they include H. 'Dance With Me', H. 'Prairie Sky', H. 'Neptune', and H. 'Rainbow's End'. These are all very deserving hosta and the Michigan Hosta Society wishes Hans the best of luck with his entries.

Our other hybridizer, Clarence Owens, did much of his work hybridizing in the 1980's when hosta were in their infancy and just becoming popular. A few of our local pioneers began crossing genes to begin transforming hostas into what they are today. One of his crosses resulted in a blue, somewhat corrugated and cupping hosta



that he named so affectionately for his wife Betty Lou. Today, H. Blue Betty Lou is well known across the country for its beautiful blue which holds well into the summer. When Clarence was presented the award, he was so excited that this hosta made the cut into the final tier of voting simply because, "it was the hosta he named for his wife". Congratulations Clarence. We all hope you do well in the voting!

## *Hosta College planners at work for 2019...*

The Board of Great Lakes Hosta College met on Friday September 21, 2018 at Dow Agro Sciences in Indianapolis, IN. We were given a two hour tour by Broch Martindale, a member of the Indianapolis Hosta Society, and an employee at Dow Agro Sciences. He informed us

about the procedure for new herbicides, pesticides, and GMO seeds to be brought to market. This is often a ten year process from inception, testing, and finally marketing. Of-

ten times if a product is not more cost effective than a prior product doing essentially the same thing, the new product is scrapped. Agro Sciences has 42 greenhouses in which they can mimic any weather anywhere in the world. Security was tight and everyone had to show ID to prove we were US citizens. Only in one room were photos allowed to be taken.



Saturday's board meeting was held in the conference room at Springhill Suites in Indianapolis. The meeting was called to order at 8 am and adjourned at 3 pm. A new Executive

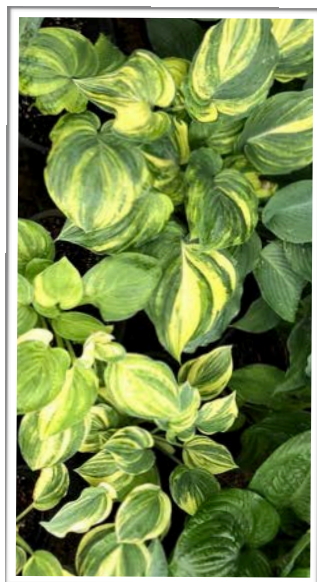

## Tips for fall cleanup

Fall is a great time to be in your garden! After the busy summer days, you can slow down and reflect on the season's growth. Stand back and just look. Do you have plants that are crowding out others? Large hostas towering over smaller ones? Or maybe two cultivars becoming intermixed (especially important for plants similar in appearance).

- Tip #1: Make a list of plants that are crowded and should be transplanted next spring.



Now look for plants that are doing poorly. Are some hostas scorched by the sun? Blues that have turned green? Yellows faded to white? Or is one struggling in too much shade? Those hostas with white centers like 'White Christmas' and poor growers like 'Great Expectations' do best in bright sunlight. Hostas with wide yellow centers including 'Paul's Glory' are more colorful in the sun. Are any deprived of water and nutrients due to root competition?

- Tip #2: Make a list of plants that are growing poorly and should be relocated next spring.

Most hosta gardeners divide their plants to enlarge their garden or to trade



with friends. Now is the time to evaluate each clump, its health, and maturity. You can record the number of eyes so you will know what's available when they pop up next spring.

- Tip #3: Record plants which are mature enough to divide.

And those slugs... are you feeding them well?



They go for the thin, tender leaves. Don't worry about the others. When July comes



next summer, those little rascals will head for the leaves that are full of holes this fall.

- Tip #4: Record hostas damaged by slugs and concentrate your slug control methods on those specific plants next summer.

Now that your lists are done, it's time to get moving!

- Tip #5: Save some hosta seeds to grow and then remove those dead flower stalks.

They aren't attractive during the winter and will be dropping a lot of seeds which creates a



weeding chore next summer. Select seeds from your favorites, especially those that are streaked and most likely to produce other streaked seedlings. Gather the seed pods when they begin to turn yellow and let them dry in a paper bag. When they start to split open, shake out the seeds and throw out the debris. Plug in the grow lights and you're ready to go!

What about a mulch for the winter? A fall application of well-composted manure or leaf mold around the perimeter of the plant will enrich the soil for next spring's growth. And

your juvenile plants, along with those recently transplanted, will benefit from protection against the cold weather. A coarse material, such as evergreen boughs, bracken fronds, straw, or pine needles can help prevent heaving during the early spring thaws. Don't rake up those large dead hosta leaves.

- Tip #6: Apply an enrichment mulch, and for young hostas, a protective mulch.

And last of all,

- Tip #7: Prepare a new site if you're a real hostaholic!

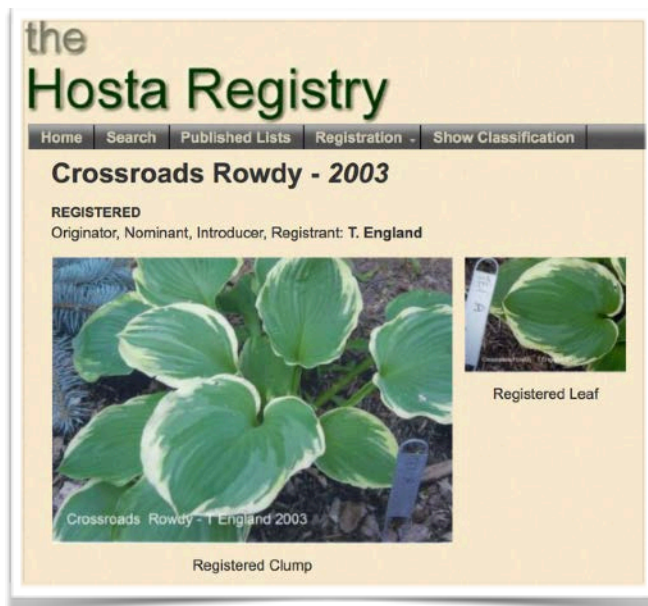
Fall is a great time to collect organic matter—grass clippings, leaves, vegetable garden leftovers, wood chips, watermelon rinds and corn cobs... all to be tilled into a new spot and composted during the fall, winter, and spring. The soil is moist and workable. The temperature is comfortable. And you have all those months to dream and plan where each new hosta will go. Soon, you will be getting the mail order catalogs and placing hosta orders. Meanwhile, grow, seedlings grow!



## Hosta Registry goes live!

In the last edition of Hosta Happenings, we reported on the changes being made to the Hosta Registry website that can be found at [www.hostaregistrar.org](http://www.hostaregistrar.org). The American Hosta Society is responsible for the nomenclature of cultivars within the genus *Hosta*. The naming of a hosta along with the size of a mature clump, the size and shape of the leaves, as well as its color are all recorded and must be approved by the Registrar in order for that plant to become “registered” and recognized by the AHS.



This website is the place where the list of registered hostas are kept for public viewing and the place to go should you ever have a question about a specific hosta cultivar. Keep in mind while surfing that you may run across some hostas where there is little recorded information about them. ‘Hosta Wheee!’, for example, has never been registered with the

AHS and so there are no pictures or leaf dimensions etc. of that plant.

At the time of our last publication of Hosta Happenings, the Hosta Registrar’s webpage had continued to be in a beta stage for testing and its contents were unfortunately not available for us to view... until now. GOOD NEWS — the website has now gone live and you can pull up your favorite hostas to see what has changed.

Now, when you type in the name of the plant, you will see a tab with the original registration details that has always been there; however, the format is a little different and much easier to read. You will also likely see pictures of the plant, its leaf, and in some cases the flower too (the AHS has been diligently taking additional photos and adding them the website when they are missing from a registration). You will also see a tab for Show Classification. This information, which includes Section and Class of the Leaf; Leaf Length; Leaf Width; and Leaf Color is extremely important to Leaf Show Judges who evaluate and award ribbons based in part on the Leaf Classification.

The final tab you will see on the newly revamped webpage is for the Hosta Finder. Clicking on this tab will take you to a list of vendors who sell a particular hosta along with the price each vendor is asking. Conveniently, you can click on the vendor’s webpage and order directly from them if you so choose to buy one. Give the new website a test drive and see if you like it!
